Happy Anniversary . 1993 is the 40th Anniversary of the Haliburton Lake Cottager's Association.

The official opening of the 40th celebration will be held on Saturday July 3 at the annual Canada Day Fireworks display, at the Public Beach. The present directors will honour all the Past Presidents of the Association that we have been able to locate and which are in attendance at this event.

The Anniversary celebrations theme will be the focus of many of our summer activities including the dances, regetta and also the theme of floats in the Rotary Parade in the town of Haliburton, Aug 4, 1993. These floats will depict the four seasonal activities on Haliburton Lake.

Enclosed with this years Newsletter, you will find a booklet on the history of Haliburton Lake. I would like to extend a special Thank You to Debbie Lambe and David Freeman for an excellent job of putting together this booklet, for all of us to enjoy. Deb and Dave put in many long hours of investigation on this project.

This year, your HLCA has the largest director representation ever, with 24 members, sitting on the board. Their names and phone numbers are listed on the back pages. With this type of participation, the future of the HLCA looks very promising for another 40 years.

Projects for this year are:

1. Clearing of trees and debris from the side of the Community Hall to make more room for parking.
2. Repairs to the back roof of the Community Hall.
3. Repairs to a main floor beam at the rear of the Community Hall.
4. Additional insulation for the water system and septic system at the Community Hall.
5. Participation with the Roads Department, for improved road repairs and upkeep, on all roads around the lake.
6. Additional Playground equipment and improvements to existing equipment at the Public Beach.
7. A garage sale, bake sale, weekly rock bass derby, regetta, baseball and the swim program.
8. HLCA Poker Run Weekend with sponsorship by the Racers Edge of Milton.

Mark Metcalfe (3468) and Paul Wilson (3472) would like to thank all those winter cottagers who generously donated to the Curry Drive Snow Removal Fund this year. As you are aware Curry Dr. is not a road the township will assume for winter maintenance. However, they have been willing to contribute towards private contracting for snowplowing on a 50/50 basis with residents. This is where we come in!

Our collection of funds in the fall (usually Thanksgiving Weekend) pays our 50% of the costs enabling all of us to enjoy the year round convenience of a plowed road. This year we collected from about 90% of the winter users (regular and casual) of Curry Dr. which is truly excellent! Last year regular users paid \$75.00 which really is a worthwhile investment. Cottage Ecology

1. Use only phosphate-free soaps and don't wash in the lake.
2. Keep water usage to a minimum.
3. Don't pour toxic wastes down your drain.
4. Have your septic tank pumped at least every 2 or 3 years to maintain its effectiveness.
5. Preserve natural vegetation around the cottage and especially along the shoreline.
6. Don't spray mosquito insecticide around the cottage. Instead, drain shallow pools of water where mosquitoes breed.
7. Turn off the water heater when you leave the cottage for any duration.
8. Don't disturb or change the lake bottom.
9. Use only plumber's antifreeze when winterizing your plumbing.
10. Report pollution problems to the Ministry of the Environment.

Come on out, we have lots of fun. BINGO starts on Tues. JULY 6.

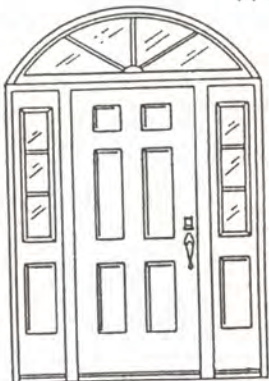

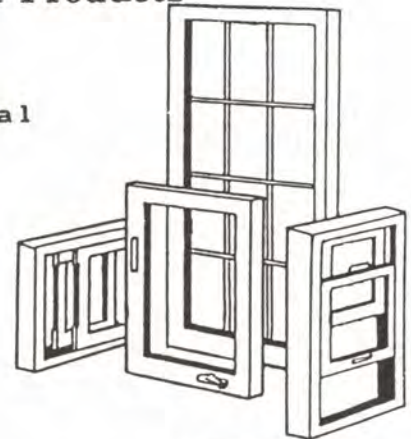

The rock bass derby will be held again this year to further efforts to rid them of our lake.

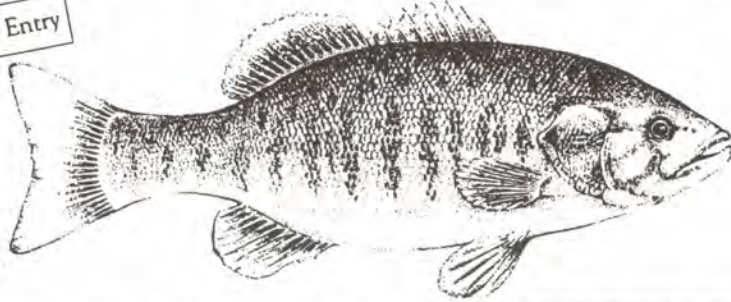

SMALLMOUTH BASS

Maternal Males Watch out for Fries

Sample Entry



DESPITE THEIR REPUTATION among anglers as feisty fighters, male smallmouth bass are truly New Age, sensitive fish. Male bass assume most of their species' traditional maternal duties. In late June or early July, they dig out a shallow nest in gravel, anywhere from 30 to 180 centimetres (1-6 ft) wide, in water depths of one to six metres (3.3-20 ft). After mates formally rub against and nip each other, the female lays her eggs in the nest, then leaves her mate to fertilize and care for them. Males guard and fan the eggs and remain with the young in the nest for up to three weeks after they hatch.

Young bass must eat well in their first months if they are to survive the winter, during which they fast and hide out amid the rocks beneath the ice. If spring and summer are cool, delaying their hatching and development, most are goners. Heavy storms also destroy nests, and bass fry are susceptible to acid rain. Bass are warm-water fish that spend most of their time motionless in the shadows near shore, waiting to suddenly dart at any prey that comes within reach. They are most active at dusk and dawn.

Smallmouth bass relatives, members of the sunfish family, also feature nest-building, fry-rearing males. The largemouth bass is almost identical, but prefers calmer, weedier waters. Squat, bony rockbass have blood-red eyes.

HALIBURTON LAKE WATER TESTING

Haliburton water samplings have been sent to the Ministry of Environment for testing the purity of our water in 1991 & 1992. Jack Armitage has received a response from the Ministry regarding the water samples.

We would like to share this report with you. This report identifies:

- 1) some history of Haliburton Lake
- 2) a Self-Help program which monitors the nutrient status of our lakes

HALIBURTON LAKE HARBURN TOWNSHIP COUNTY OF HALIBURTON

Haliburton Lake is situated on the Canadian Shield. The physiography of the area surrounding the lake is typical of the region, consisting of bare rock ridges and shallow till, except in the southern end where a glacial spillway is located. Water flows into Haliburton Lake via the Gull River from Percy Lake, and from numerous other small streams which drain the small surrounding lakes. Haliburton Lake discharges into Oblong Lake. It has a maximum depth of 55 m and an average depth of 18 m. Haliburton Lake occupies a surface area of approximately 10 square kilometres, and is naturally divided into two distinct basins -- the main lake and South Bay.

Results from the 1990 and 1991 sampling programs are shown in the following table. Unfortunately, sampling was not conducted over a long enough stretch of the summer in 1990, and not frequently enough in 1991, to allow calculation of reliable seasonal averages. Based on individual measurements, however, the water of Haliburton Lake appeared to be clear (Secchi depths ranging from 4.8 to 8.3 m) with relatively low to moderate levels of algal growth (chlorophyll a concentrations ranging from 0.8 to 5.0 µg/L).

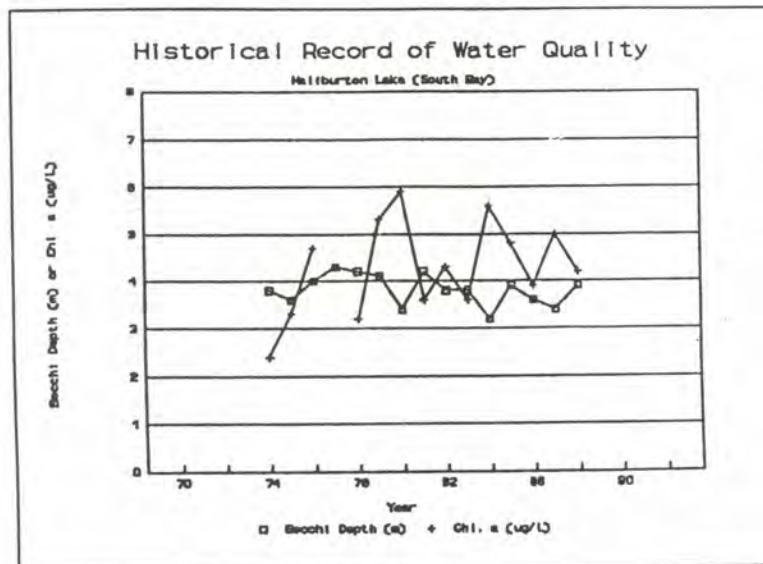
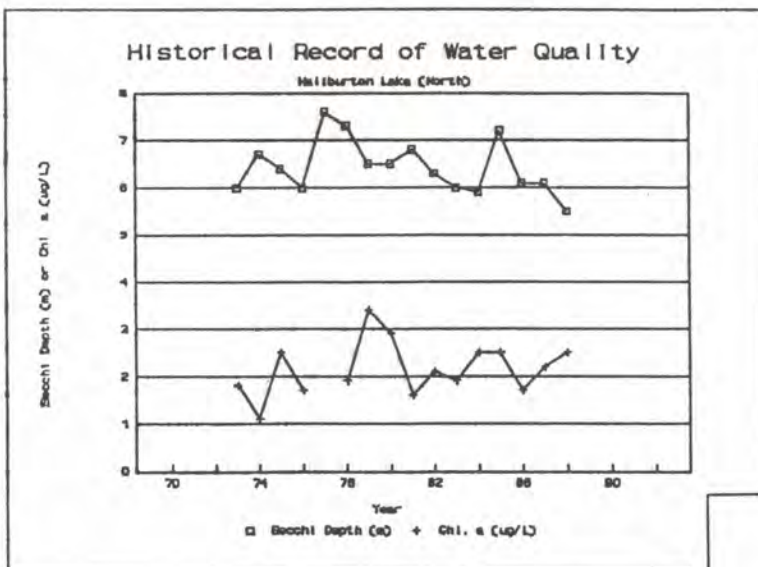

A long historical record, with sixteen consecutive years of sampling, provides an excellent data base from which to provide comments about water quality trends in Haliburton Lake (see following figures). However, the results from 1990 and 1991 were not considered reliable and were not added to the graphs for the reasons stated above. Historically, samples have been collected from two stations, namely Main Bay and South Bay. Secchi disc readings for the Main Bay station have consistently been high, ranging from 5.5 to 7.5 m, indicating good water clarity. Chlorophyll *a* densities reflect low to moderate growths of algae. These results indicate that the Main Bay station has had excellent water quality over the years. In contrast, the record of water quality at the South Bay station is typical of waters that are enriched or moderately enriched with nutrients. Neither station has exhibited any significant change in water quality over the years. Sampling in the future is encouraged in order to add to the excellent record of water quality for Haliburton Lake.

Recommendations: In order to obtain reliable seasonal averages, sampling should be conducted on at least six occasions evenly spaced in time, commencing in late May and ending by or on the Labour Day weekend in early September.



THE SELF-HELP PROGRAM

Lakes are conspicuous features of the Ontario landscape. Over the years, they have been used for transportation, water supplies, fishing and recreation. Not just collections of water, lakes support a wide range of aquatic life forms, from microscopic single-celled plants to large fish. Numerous factors influence the composition of this biological community in a lake. The amount of nutrients in a lake is one of these factors. The purpose of the Self-Help program is to monitor the nutrient status of Ontario's lakes.

As their name suggests, nutrients are substances which provide nourishment. They are required for plant growth. In the case of lakes, the most important plant nutrients are phosphorus, nitrogen, and carbon. The amount of these nutrients that is available in a lake directly affects the growth and abundance of both simple plants (algae) and more complex rooted "weeds". There are many sources of nutrients both natural, such as precipitation and soil erosion, and those that occur as a result of human activities.

Lakes can be classified according to the amount of nutrients they have. Unenriched (nutrient-poor) lakes are typically clearer and have less biological production than enriched (nutrient-rich) lakes. Enriched lakes commonly support prolific growths of aquatic plants such as algae. Algae provide a vital foundation for the biological food chain of a lake. Algae are eaten by small "water fleas". These are eaten by small fish which, in turn, are eaten by larger fish.

Though generally microscopic, during periods of rapid growth algae may accumulate in visible "blooms" suspended in the water column. High densities of algae reduce water clarity and in some circumstances, such as during a bloom, may limit a lake's suitability for recreational uses. Excessive algal growth may be detrimental to other aquatic life; when algae die and decompose, the limited oxygen dissolved in a lake's bottom waters may be depleted.

The Ontario Ministry of the Environment undertakes monitoring and assessment of the quality of lakes throughout the province. Since the initiation of the Self-Help Program in 1971, cottagers and other lakefront property owners have been important partners in this endeavour. Throughout the summer, volunteers collect water samples from lakes and submit them to the Ministry's laboratory in Toronto. At the laboratory these samples are analyzed for their chlorophyll content.

Chlorophyll is a green pigment found in all algae. It functions to capture radiant energy from sunlight for photosynthesis. The amount of chlorophyll a pigment in a water sample can be used as an indication of the amount of algae present.

The volunteer samplers also record the clarity of the lake water using a standardized circular black and white plate called a Secchi disc. The disc is attached to a cord and lowered slowly into the lake. The depth at which the Secchi disc disappears from view is taken as an indication

of the degree of water clarity. This simple technique is commonly used by scientists in studies of lakes and oceans.

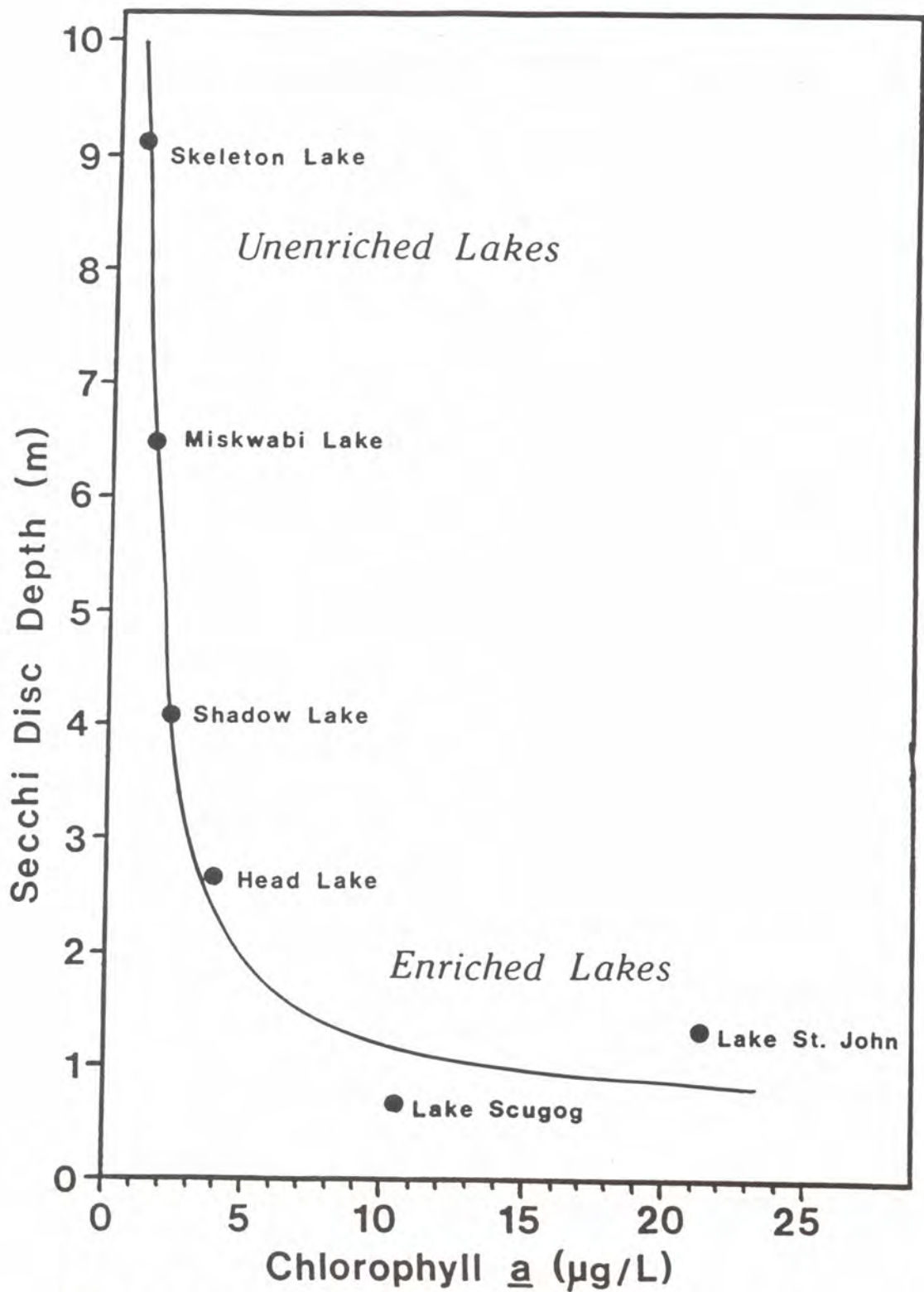


Figure 1. The relationship between Secchi disc depth and chlorophyll *a* concentration.

The relationship between Secchi disc readings and chlorophyll a concentrations follows a typical pattern, as depicted in Figure 1. Although there are certain other factors that may affect this relationship, unenriched lakes are generally characterized by high Secchi disc readings and low concentrations of chlorophyll a; enriched lakes typically have low Secchi disc readings and high concentrations of chlorophyll a. Variability in Secchi disc readings and chlorophyll a measurements occurs naturally from year to year. Analysis of trends in these measurements throughout a number of years allows scientists to differentiate between natural year to year variations and any real changes that may be occurring in the water quality of a lake.

In conducting this type of lake assessment, it is important that the sampling be conducted in such a manner that the results are representative of the whole summer period. In lakes, algal densities and Secchi depths normally rise and fall throughout the summer in response to different light, temperature, and nutrient conditions. Sampling must be conducted in such a manner that the times of both high and low algal growth are represented. In this way, averages calculated from the individual measurements are representative of the "average" conditions in the lake over the summer. To ensure the quality of the seasonal averages, we utilized some standard criteria for determining whether or not the sampling program on a particular lake was representative of the entire summer period. These criteria were:

1. Sampling had to occur on at least five occasions over the summer period;
2. The time between the first and last sampling dates had to be greater than or equal to 60 days; and
3. Sampling had to commence no later than July 5 and end no sooner than August 5.

All three of these conditions had to be met in order to calculate seasonal averages, and to enter these values in the data base of historical water quality.

Though monitoring, such as occurs through the Self-Help program, is important, the best method for protecting the water quality of our lakes is to minimize additional nutrient inputs from human activities. Ensuring that septic tanks and tile fields are properly sited and functioning, eliminating the use of lawn fertilizers, preventing erosion from exposed soil at construction sites and retaining or re-establishing natural shoreline vegetation are just a few of the ways in which waterfront property owners can help reduce nutrient inputs and protect lake water quality.

The Ministry of the Environment publishes an environmental manual for cottagers called "Cottage Country" that, among other things, contains useful information regarding the protection of lake water quality. Copies of "Cottage Country" and other publications are available free of charge from your local Ministry of the Environment office.
